Patriotic Instructor's Message

Good January, Brothers!

This month in 1863 saw Major General Ambrose Burnside relieved of the command of the Army of the Potomac and replaced with Major General Joseph Hooker. Here is a bit more about that.

A career United States Army officer and Mexican-American War veteran, Hooker was appointed in 1861 as a brigadier general of the Union Army. Hooker began the war commanding a division of the Army of the Potomac around Washington DC under Major General George McClellan.

In 1862 Hooker commanded the 2nd Division of the III Corps in the Peninsula Campaign. During this time Hooker earned the reputation of an aggressive leader who cared for the welfare of his men. Hooker led the First Corps at Antietam under McClellan where he was injured in the foot. When McClellan failed to pursue Lee's army after Antietam, Lincoln replaced "Little Mac" with Major General Ambrose Burnside. Following a loss at Fredericksburg and a series of poor decisions Lincoln removed Burnside, promoting Hooker to the commander of the Army of the Potomac in early 1863.

As commander of the Army of the Potomac, Hooker improved conditions for the soldiers including food, medical care, and leave. However, disagreements with his staff and commanders along with a loss to, Confederate commander, General Robert E. Lee at Chancellorsville, Virginia led to Hooker's resignation as the commander of the Army of the Potomac.

Hooker continued his career in the United States Army and in the summer of 1863 transferred with the XI and XII Corps to the Western Theater with the Army of the Cumberland. Hooker enjoyed success at the Battle of Chattanooga and the Battle of Lookout Mountain. He was also successful in the 1864 Atlanta Campaign under the command of General William Tecumseh Sherman. From October 1864 until the war's conclusion Hooker commanded the Northern Department from headquarters in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Mustered out of service in 1866, he retired from the Army in 1868, and is buried in Cincinnati, Ohio.

1st Sons of Veterans Camp in Fort Worth

On April 22, 1890, mustering officer Cpt. Louis H. Scheubert organized a Sons of Veterans Camp at Como Hall. It was named Parmley Camp in honor of GAR Post 4. There were nineteen charter members. A.N. McLaughlin was elected the first captain of the camp.

On May 3, 1890, there is a blurb in the newspaper from Col. Otis E. Gully commanding Arkansas Division, Sons of Veterans, USA. The division HQ had received the new camp's communication with the check for their charter and supplies. Col. Gully rejoiced at the new camp and welcomed them to the 100,000 man brotherhood.

Sons of Veterans. Louis H. Schubert, who has made arrangements to organize a post of Sons of Veterans, which will be an auxilary to the Parmley post, Grand Army of the Republic, is in receipt of the following communication which explains itsel f: HEADQUAETERS ABK. DIV. SONS OF VETERANS, U. S. A., SPRINGDALE, ARRANSAS. L. H. Schubert: DEAR SIR-Our division headquarters is in receipt of your communication with the check for charter and supplies. Those are the kind that make us feel good and score a large 1 recognized not only by our own division, but throughout the length and breadth of the land. It is hailed with delight, and 100,000 brothers bid you a hearty welcome and wish you God-speed. [Signed] OTIS E. GULLY, Colonel Commanding. As soon as the charter arrives a call will be issued by Col. Schubert and the organization put on a working basis. From appearances now it promises to be very successful, and the gallant colonel is jubilant over the prospects.

On May 15, 1890, Parmley camp was officially mustered in at Como Hall. GAR members were invited to attend the mustering.

Parmley Camp took part in Memorial Day observances in 1890 & 1891. They took part in the commemorations with GAR Posts 4 & 39 and the Woman's Relief Corp.

On 11 September 1890, the Sons of Veterans and the WRC had a grand ball and festival at Huffman's Hall. Over 50 couples danced the night away to "a good orchestra." "Choice refreshments of a refrigerated character were served and much enjoyed by the dancers." There was a social party at Mr. George W. Hill's residence in October 1890. It was attended mostly by the GAR, WRC, and the Sons. The WRC presented the Parmley Camp with "a handsome new flag."

Huffman's Hall was the meeting place for the Sons. The meetings were held on Thursdays at 7:30 pm.

The Parmley Camp, Sons of Veterans must have been short lived. I see no mention of them in the newspapers after Memorial Day 1891.

Camp 1 Ancestor

From Bro Timothy Phillips:

My great grandpa, William R. Phillips, enlisted in what became B Company, 6th Tennessee Cavalry. It was a notorious regiment, organized and led by Fielding Hurst. Great grandpa was a farmer in Civil District 11, Henderson County TN. He married a Confed in 1866 and came to Texas around 1883, settling northwest of Abilene.
